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ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

Global governance bodies increasingly perform activities of government, including through the regulation of individual human and collective State activity. Yet the integrity of global governance today is contingent on the function and role of international law. This is evidenced by States actively expanding the breadth and scope of international rules to regulate emerging challenges, including sea-level rise and cyberspace. The development of international rules on themes such as marine activities, armed conflict, international trade, and human rights, equally demonstrate the contribution of international law. However, as the Sustainable Development Goals indicate, international law must rise to meet new issues, including eradicating hunger and poverty, empowering girls and women, and protecting the environment. The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic reminds us that for crises faced by humankind, solutions must be coordinated at a global scale.



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FEATURED KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



DR. P. S. RAO is an international lawyer who headed the Legal and Treaties Division, Ministry of External Affairs, India, and was the chief legal advisor of India on international law matters from 1985 to 2002. He was Judge *ad hoc* of the International Court of Justice in the case concerning sovereignty over Pedra Branca/Pulau Batu Pateh, Middle Rocks and South Ledge from 2004–2008. He was a member of the International Law Commission from 1987 to 2006 and served as its chairman in 1995.

Dr. Rao is an expert in the prevention of and international liability for transboundary harm arising from hazardous activities. He served as a Special Rapporteur for the subject of Prevention and Liability from 1997–2006 and has been a member of the Bangladesh-India Maritime Arbitration Tribunal since 2010.

Presently, he is a Special adviser in the office of the Attorney-General, State of Qatar and Visiting Professor at the Center for International Law Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University. He is an honorary visiting professor at Damodaram Sanjivayya National Law University, Visakhapatnam.



Ms. MAJA GROFF is an international lawyer who has assisted in the development and servicing of multilateral treaties, also working at various international criminal tribunals and teaching regularly at the Hague Academy of International Law. She has worked on existing and potential global treaties addressing, inter alia, areas of child law, issues disproportionately affecting women, persons with disabilities, access to legal information and a range of other topics, as well as on the pioneering International Hague Network of Judges. She has regularly conducted liaison work with international organisations (including various UN bodies), international professional associations, NGOs and has played a key role in the convening of a range of international legal expert groups.

Ms. Groff has drafted international legal policy documents for inter-governmental processes and published academically on private and public international law, human rights and global governance.

She is admitted to practice in the state of New York and has served on the International Law and UN Committees of the New York City Bar Association, and the (Advisory) Boards of BCorp Europe and ebbf, organisations devoted to ethical business. She was a winner of the 2018 New Shape Prize for global governance innovation.



PROFESSOR ERNST ULRICH PETERSMANN taught constitutional law at the Universities of Hamburg and Heidelberg and was a Professor of international law and European law at the Universities of St. Gallen, Fribourg, Geneva, the Geneva Graduate Institute of International Relations and the European University Institute at Florence As a visiting professor, Professor Petersmann taught international economic law at the Hague Academy of International Law, the EUI Academy of European Law, the Xiamen Academy of International Law, and at numerous Universities in Germany, Switzerland, Italy, Spain, the USA, Latin-America, South-Africa, China, India and Singapore.

Professor Petersmann has published more than 30 books and 350 contributions to books and journals focusing on international law, European law and comparative constitutional law. He worked as legal counsel for the German government representing Germany in European and UN institutions (1978-1980), as well as legal counsel in GATT and legal

consultant for the WTO (1981-2021). He served as secretary, member or chairman on GATT and WTO dispute settlement panels and as chairman of the International Trade Law Committee of the International Law Association (1999-2014).

CHAIR BIOGRAPHIES



Ms. MELINA ANTONIADIS is a Canadian lawyer specialising in public international law and human rights. She has advised in proceedings before the International Court of Justice, the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea and the European Court of Human Rights, and has held positions at the Court of Justice of the European Union and the Extraordinary Chambers in the Courts of Cambodia.

Ms. Antoniadis is currently a Project Attorney for Blue Ocean Law, providing assistance to the Republic of Vanuatu in its initiative to request an Advisory Opinion on climate change from the International Court of Justice. A member of the Law Society of Ontario, Ms. Antoniadis completed her training at the Crown Law Office Civil of the Ontario Ministry of the

Attorney General.



DR. JOHN BARKER is a Fellow of the Lauterpacht Centre for International Law and Director of Cambridge Governance Labs. His principal areas of current professional engagement are governance risk, environmental law, administrative justice, and human rights. As former Chairman of the Foreign Compensation Commission, Foreign and Commonwealth Office, his area of focus was international claims.

With professional experience in Africa spanning more than 30 years, he has advised the UNDP, Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights, European Commission, CIDA and DFID on the promotion of the rule of law, anti-corruption strategies and transitional justice.



PROFESSOR CATHERINE BARNARD is a Professor of EU law and Employment Law and a senior tutor and fellow of Trinity College. She is the author of *EU Employment Law*, *The Substantive Law of the EU: The Four Freedoms*, and *European Union Law*. She is a member of the European Commission funded European Labour Law Network and a Senior Fellow in the U.K. in the Changing Europe Project. This think tank researches and provides information about all aspects of Brexit. Part of its remit is to make that information accessible to the public via public engagement, especially with the media.

She has appeared extensively on the main media channels, such as BBC, ITV and Sky, as well as some of the more specialist programmes such as

Law in Action, Woman's Hour and the Briefing Room. She has also written for The Guardian and The Telegraph. Dr. Barnard has given evidence to numerous select committees on the legal issues connected with Brexit, immigration and the European Union (Withdrawal) Act. PROFESSOR LORAND BARTELS is a fellow of Trinity Hall at the University of Cambridge, where he teaches international law, WTO law and EU law at the Faculty of Law. He was appointed MBE in the 2022 Queen's New Year Honours List for services to UK trade policy. Professor Bartels is a general editor of the Cambridge International Trade and Economic Law Series (CUP), and an editorial board member of several journals, including the Journal of International Economic Law, Journal of World Trade and Legal Issues of Economic Integration. He also helped to establish the Society of International Economic Law.

Professor Bartels practices in trade law as counsel at Freshfields, and he has advised on WTO and FTA law, as well on general international law and EU

law, for a number of countries, NGOs, international organizations, and the private sector. In 2011, he was commissioned by the Southern African Development Community (SADC) Ministers of Justice to conduct a review of the SADC Tribunal, which led to a new Protocol to the SADC Treaty. From 2016–2017 he was the first Specialist Advisor to the UK House of Commons Select Committee on International Trade. Professor Bartels has appeared on numerous occasions before parliamentary select committees in the UK, Belgium, as well as the European Parliament, and has significant experience in conducting training in trade law for government officials from a range of countries, such as the UK, Australia, Vietnam and others.

In 2019 he was appointed a member of the UK Government's Alternative Arrangements Advisory Group (AAAG), advising ministers on means of mitigating controls on the Ireland/Northern Ireland border. In 2021 he was appointed the first Chair of the UK's Trade and Agricultural Commission advising the Government and Parliament on the impact of new FTAs on the maintenance of UK animal and plant health, environmental and animal welfare standards.



DR. NAFAY CHOUDHURY is a Junior Research Fellow at St Catharine's. His work sits at the intersection of socio-legal studies, legal pluralism, economic development, and the rule of law. His current research looks at the role of market associations in providing normative order in fragile settings.

Dr. Choudhury completed his Ph.D. at King's College London where he undertook an ethnographic study of Afghanistan's money exchangers to understand the interaction of state and nonstate legal systems in the production of legal order. He has been a Research Fellow for the Institute for Global Law and Policy at Harvard Law School since 2019 and is Senior Research Fellow at the Afghan Institute for Strategic Studies.

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
